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## **International Meeting on Ecology for Books**

Presentation and problematization

Social and societal transformations, the environmental crisis, changes in reading practices and the weakening of the book chain are all raising in-depth questions. As early as the bid phase for the UNESCO World Book Capital 2024 label, Strasbourg made the issue of ecology for books an essential part of its project, in particular through the 'Reading for the Planet' programme.

This label now gives Strasbourg a specific responsibility to its local and national partners, as well as to its sisters cities, and in its future role as coordinator of the World Book Capitals network in 2025/2026, in line with the UN's advocacy of an eighteenth Sustainable Development Goal (SDG) for culture.

With the aim of giving an international dimension to the debate on ecology for books, the City of Strasbourg, in partnership with the University of Strasbourg and the Grand Est Region, has decided to organise the International Meeting on Ecology for Books (RIEL). These meetings will form part of a wide-ranging initiative to transform public policies, including those relating to culture, through the implementation of cultural climate classes and the training of local players in book frescoes.

## The aims of the meeting:

- 1. To review the **state of the art** and highlight issues and experiences in a variety of national and international contexts by drawing on expertise and contemporary thinking
- **2.** To offer **keys to understanding** a book chain that is often complex and whose interests are often contradictory
- **3. To highlight experiences, practices and prospects** for change and adaptation in the short and long term, in a spirit of unity and a spirit of combating eco-anxiety
- 4. Open up to the expression of new perspectives

A wide-ranging programme has been developed and consolidated by a scientific committee of national and international experts, with the aim of drawing on a variety of forms and expressions for an event which – as well as bringing the World Book Capital Year to an end – will serve as a link for future World Book Capitals and all the partners involved.

- 1. A free event combining scientific content with an open approach to the general public.
- 2. A variety of formats: large-scale or more targeted conferences, round tables, forums, etc.

### 09 - 10 am : Overview of environmental issues in the book ecosystem

This sequence will highlight the challenges of climate change and the urgent need for action through a summary of the IPCC reports, and will be followed by a focus on the European Regulation on Reducing Deforestation and Forest Degradation and its repercussions on the book chain. The environmental challenges of the book ecosystem will also be explored by highlighting strategies aimed at reducing the ecological impact of this ecosystem, and the role of private and public actors, as well as professional organizations, in this transformation.

# 10.30 - 11.30 am : (Inter)professional approaches to book ecology and bibliodiversity: history, policy approaches and field initiatives in France and worldwide

This round table retraces the history and political approaches in favour of book ecology and bibliodiversity by analysing the role of the professional and inter-professional co-operations that support them. It will highlight the creation of committed collectives, as well as concrete initiatives led in France and abroad, such as solidarity-based co-editions and the truce on new releases, while questioning the means of structuring a transformation of the industry.

#### 11.45 - 12.15 am: Presentation of the research project "decarbonising books and publishing"

This research project (2022-2025)<sup>1</sup> explores the environmental impacts and the levers of change of the various book sectors. Structured around seven themes, it is based on carbon footprints, data collection and experiments to identify and reduce the main sources of greenhouse gas emissions. The results and recommendations, which will be unveiled at the conference, are aiming at committing the book ecosystem to the ecological and social transition.

Paper is a key element in the book chain, from production and printing to disposal and recycling, involving many different actors. However, this essential resource is becoming increasingly scarce, and its excessive use is generating major environmental issues such as overproduction, destruction of ecosystems and waste management. This round table will be an opportunity to bring together the different links of the book chain to share their expertise and good practice, while rethinking the current model towards a collective – rather than fragmented – approach.

## Round table 1:02 - 03.30 pm: Transcending Western ethnocentrism: reflections on book donations, bibliodiversity and publishing in French-speaking Africa

This round table will address the imbalances in the circulation of books between the North and the South, where African markets are often dominated by foreign productions. It will highlight the efforts made by African publishers to promote an offer rooted in specific literary, linguistic and educational realities, while examining the ecological impact of the massive export of books from the North to the South, which are often unsuited for local needs. The aim is to consider solutions for a more equitable circulation of knowledge and works, more specifically in French-speaking Africa, by supporting sustainable and inclusive bibliodiversity.
